Mayor's Corner

Paperless Agendas Update Budget numbers

Motion was made by Alderman Moore, seconded by Alderman Simpson, to approve the agenda as presented. All present voting yea, motion carried.

Update on the WWTP Project, Mike Faulkner

Mike Faulkner with ESI gave the Mayor and Board of Aldermen an update on the WWTP project. The project should be substantially complete by May 22^{nd} , to meet the financing deadline. Mr. Faulkner stated that there was a change order he wanted to request. Mr. Faulkner recommended that we add a Lime Fee System, Blower Controls, and Sludge Drying System, for a total of \$392,602. That will still leave you under budget, by about \$50,000.00. There is another option, requires more manual labor, but I think it is better to replace the electrical system and do it the right way.

Alderman Moore stated it makes sense to go ahead and upgrade all of it since we've already spent about \$8 million.

Alderman Dear stated I don't see anything backing up now.

Motion was made by Alderman Dear, seconded by Alderman Moore, to approve the change order adding the Lime Feed System, the Blower Controls, and the Sludge Drying System for a total of \$392,602.22. All present voting yea, motion carried.

<u>Downtown Revitalization Project - One Way Streets, and Public Input</u>

Kevin McLeod with Elliott & Britt Engineering presented an updated map of the proposed parking with one-way streets and the current parking to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. Mr. McLeod stated the area that will lose the most parking is on Front Street. We have been talking about a future walking trail, going down the railroad across town, bringing more people in town. Mr. McLeod stated there are different ways to handle the concern with deliveries taking up parking, you could have signs for no parking during certain delivery hours. Mr. McLeod stated this map doesn't include ADA parking. When we add those in, you may lose a few parking bays. Typically, 1 ADA spot equals 2 regular spots.

Jamie Sowell stated I think everyone is looking at us having 2 options, but that's not it. It's really either change and have extra parking or change and have no additional parking. This proposal adds parking, brings us compliant with ADA and corrects the turn radius for the fire trucks.

Alderman Moore I've walked this whole thing with Kevin and others. On concern is Ward St. It's tight and the building on the corner, the access is not safe, there isn't enough room. I'm not an advocate of one-way streets, but if we do one-way streets, we gain parking, it gives space on the corner, the curb, and brings it ADA compliant. Having just 2 one-way's makes no sense. That brought up the idea of just making it a loop. I think it is best overall for downtown.

Jennifer Copeland stated Adam was talking about my building. It is dangerous. The sidewalk is maybe 30 inches. On the front, it's hard to get things in with all of those iron rails. There is no parking. It does make sense. When you come out of the side door, you can fall and break your neck.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre, 108 & 110 Center St, stated that one of their concerns was the trucks or tractor trailers dropping off on our street. Not everyone sees all of them. All types of trucks, all times of the day, so I don't think the no parking signs will work. The bank gets a shred it truck a few times a week. Another concern, on College it's a one way for the school in the morning and afternoon. So, if anyone wants to come to our business, they will have to sit in school traffic.

Jamie Sowell stated it is one way in the moringa for about an hour and in the afternoon or about an hour and a half. There is a lane where you can pass, go around the school traffic.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked why they weren't aware of this before it went up for a vote.

Mayor Graves answered this hasn't been voted on, it was just a discussion.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked what if we can't get customers down the street because of delivery trucks in the way.

Kevin McLeod stated a suggestion is for deliveries to be scheduled.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked about accidents, we need good signage. Also, will Front Street become a one-way?

Kevin McLeod answered Front Street will remain two way.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked if the larger trucks would be able to make the turn.

Kevin McLeod answered yes, a fire truck will fit. Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked about in front of the Police Station.

Jamie Sowell answered there will not be parking in front of the doors. Mrs. Sowell stated there are several ways to make the deliveries for one-way streets. This proposal will make it safer for your customers, its adding a sidewalk.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre stated I think we will have a need for more parking, Delta Steakhouse is about to start serving breakfast and lunch. The current overflow parks on our street.

Jamie Sowell answered yes, we are adding more parking.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre asked what Mrs. Sowell meant about there being 2 options, change or no change.

Jamie Sowell answered if Ward Street is one way, Center St has to be one way. If we make Ward St ADA compliant and not one way, there will be no parking on Ward. So change, having the one way streets and additional parking or change bringing Ward St ADA compliant and not having additional parking downtown and no parking on Ward.

Kevin McLeod stated Ward St is not wide enough for parking and two-way traffic.

Terry Widdle asked if Court parking will be instructed to park back behind city hall and Delta Steakhouses instructed to park on Front St and not Center St.

Jamie Sowell stated it is important that all of the parking we are discussing is public parking.

Edmund and Emmy Pitre stated one issue is not just for our clients, it is the workers. Most of our parking is filled with workers from the Bank. Mrs. Pitre stated that we shared parking but lately the owner of the parking lot across the street has been mean to my customers. We have always parked over there, our customers, and now they can't. He threatens to tow their cars if they are parked over there. Mrs. Pitre stated she is also concerned about accidents. We need a big sign for one-ways.

Mayor Graves stated that the parking lot you're speaking of is private property, it doesn't belong to the city.

Jamie Sowell agreed about needing more signage.

Thurman Caldwell, 401 W Main& rental properties downtown, handed out a list of questions and concerns he had regarding this project and read it aloud. Mr. Caldwell asked who is in charge of this project. Mr. Caldwell stated that only about 15% of residents know about this. Mr. Caldwell's first concern was regarding the dumpsters, he asked how many were planned and in what locations. Mr. Caldwell also asked about the fee for them, what it will look like for customers. Mr. Caldwell also had concerns regarding Ward St, the safety and parking of it being a one-way street and school traffic. Mr. Caldwell also stated that the number of parking bays listed as existing and proposed is misleading, stating that there is currently space that people utilize for parking now. In the plan you show no existing and 12 proposed parking bays. Mr. Caldwell also asked about parking on Front Street, it shows a loss of parking there. Mr. Caldwell asked about the island of green space on the drawing that appears to be blocking the drive thru access on the west side of the property located at 409 W Main St. Mr. Caldwell stated he is not for placing green space islands or enlarging current ones that would be in place of parking places. It will provide no additional safety, just loss of parking. Mr. Caldwell inquired about handicap parking, the leased parking lot on Ward St, the utility infrastructure work, and notifying citizens, businesses, etc.

Mayor Graves answered Mr. Caldwell stating that the Board of Aldermen are ultimately in charge of this project, myself, Kevin, Jamie and other city officials all have input.

Jamie Sowell answered stating actually 60% of the businesses and residents in this area know about this project, I had to get signatures for it.

Kevin McLeod answered regarding parking, I did not include any bays that are not legal parking bays. This is a conceptual drawing. There was a plan with a list of what was wanted done in the project, and it was signed off on by 60% of the downtown residents and business owners. The plan was adopted by this Board.

Michael Cathey suggested having a public hearing to get all of the public's input.

Motion was made by Alderman Dear, seconded by Alderman Hale, to table this item. All voting yea, motion carried.

<u>Public Hearing – Amendment of the Zoning Ordinance regarding fences and sod</u>

Mayor Graves opened the Public Hearing for the Zoning Ordinance Amendment, asking if anyone from the Public was there for this item.

No one spoke.

Zoning Ordinance Amendment

Article III. General Provisions

Section 1

Adding to the end of the section

No Fence shall impede or divert the flow of water through any drainage easement unless by adequate investigation by the city engineer.

All fences and walls shall be maintained, in structurally sound condition and in good repair. Fences shall be free from loose or rotting materials and shall have braces and supports attached or fastened in accordance with common building practices. Fences shall have smooth side, the side without bracing, of the fence facing toward the street.

Article VI Administration & Enforcement

Section 5 – Certificate of occupancy required

Adding to the end of the section

Sod shall be laid to cover all exposed areas of the construction site.

Appendix A – Minimum Design Standards

Section 6 Screening (Buffers, Fences, Walls, and Retaining Walls)

Paragraph 3, Sub Section C

Replacing existing with the following

All fences installed in any commercial district will need to go before the Planning Commission for approval. Exception for iron fence of a standard design, this may be staff approved.

This slated of prospective commission member shall be presented to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen so that they may appoint member to the SHPC.

Motion was made by Alderman Hale, seconded by Alderman Tanksley, to authorize to approve the change to the Senatobia Historic Preservation Commission Bylaws, as presented. All voting yea, motion carried.

RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF SENATOBIA, MISSISSIPPI, DECLARING THE INTENTION TO ISSUE GENERAL OBLIGATION PARKS AND RECREATION IMPROVEMENTS BONDS OF THE MUNICIPALITY, TO ISSUE A GENERAL OBLIGATION PARKS AND RECREATION QUALIFIED OBLIGATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY FOR SALE TO THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT, OR TO ENTER INTO A LOAN AGREEMENT WITH THE MISSISSIPPI DEVELOPMENT BANK, OR ANY COMBINATION THEREOF, ALL IN THE MAXIMUM AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$1,800,000, IN ONE OR MORE FEDERALLY TAXABLE OR TAX-EXEMPT SERIES, TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR THE AUTHORIZED PURPOSES AS DEFINED HEREIN; DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION; AND FOR RELATED PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Senatobia, Mississippi (the "Governing Body" of the "Municipality"), acting for and on behalf of the Municipality, hereby finds, determines, adjudicates, and declares as follows:

- 1. "Act" shall mean, together, House Bill 1504, as approved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi (the "Legislature" of the "State") in its Regular Session 2014 and signed by the Governor (the "Governor") of the State on March 21, 2014, House Bill No. 1473, as approved by the Legislature in its Regular Session 2017 and signed by the Governor on March 29, 2017, House Bill No. 1483, as approved by the Legislature in its Regular Session 2021 and signed by the Governor on April 14, 2021 (together, the "Authority Act"), Section 17-1-3, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, Sections 55-9-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended, Sections 21-33-301 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Municipal Improvements Act"), Sections 31-25-1 et seq., Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended (the "Bank Act"), and other applicable laws of the State.
- 2. "General Municipal Improvements Authorized Purpose" shall mean erecting municipal buildings, auditoriums, community centers, gymnasiums, and athletic stadiums, preparing and equipping athletic fields, and purchasing buildings or land therefor, and for repairing, improving, adorning, and equipping the same; erecting or purchasing waterworks, gas, electric, and other public utility plants or distribution systems or franchises, and repairing, improving, and extending the same; establishing sanitary, storm, drainage, or sewerage systems, and repairing, improving, and extending the same; protecting the Municipality, its streets, and sidewalks from overflow, caving banks, and other like dangers; constructing, improving, or paving streets, sidewalks, driveways, parkways, walkways, or public parking facilities, and purchasing land therefor; purchasing land for parks and public playgrounds, and improving, equipping, and adorning the same, including the constructing, repairing, and equipping of swimming pools and other recreational facilities; constructing bridges and culverts; altering or changing the channels of streams and water courses to control, deflect, or guide the current thereof; purchasing fire-fighting equipment and apparatus, and providing housing for same, and purchasing land therefor; purchasing machinery and equipment which have an expected useful life in excess of 10 years.
- 3. The Authority Act was approved by the Legislature and signed by the Governor for the purpose of authorizing and providing funds for the development of parks and recreation and tourism in the Municipality and for related purposes as authorized by the Authority Act (the "Special Tax Authorized Purpose," and together with the General Municipal Improvements Authorized Purpose, the "Authorized Purposes").

- 4. On April 1, 2014, the Governing Body adopted a resolution calling for a special election on the issue of levying a 2% tax upon the gross proceeds of room rentals for hotels and motels within the Municipality and a 2% tax upon the gross proceeds of restaurant sales within the Municipality, which funds shall be used for the Special Tax Authorized Purpose, as authorized by the Authority Act (the "Special Sales Tax"). After publication of notice of such election pursuant to the Authority Act, the citizens of the Municipality approved the Special Sales Tax by election on May 20, 2014.
- 5. The assessed value of all property within the Municipality, according to the last completed assessment for taxation, is \$82,179,991; the Municipality has \$9,240,000 of outstanding bonded indebtedness subject to the 15% debt limit prescribed by the Municipal Improvements Act, and outstanding bonded and floating indebtedness subject to the 20% debt limit prescribed by the Municipal Improvements Act (which amount includes the sum set forth above subject to the 15% debt limit), in the amount of \$9,240,000; the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation (both as defined below) hereinafter proposed to be issued, when added to the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the Municipality, will not result in bonded indebtedness, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 15% debt limit, of more than 15% of the assessed value of taxable property within the Municipality, and will not result in indebtedness, both bonded and floating, exclusive of indebtedness not subject to the aforesaid 20% debt limit, in excess of 20% of the assessed value of taxable property within the Municipality and will not exceed any constitutional or statutory limitation upon indebtedness which may be incurred by the Municipality.
- 6. The Municipality is authorized by the Act to issue the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation for the Authorized Purposes, for which purpose there are no other available funds on hand, and it is necessary and in the public interest to issue such General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation.
- 7. Pursuant to the Act and other applicable laws of the State, the Municipality is authorized to undertake activities for the Authorized Purposes, and to provide for the payment of the costs thereof, or any portion of such costs, by issuing general obligation parks and recreation improvements bonds payable from the Special Sales Tax and ad valorem tax levies, if and when necessary, in one or more federally taxable or tax-exempt series, in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$1,800,000 (the "General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds"), by issuing a general obligation parks and recreation improvements bond of the Municipality for sale to the Mississippi Development Bank (the "Bank"), in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$1,800,000, in one or more federally taxable or tax-exempt series (the "General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation"), or entering into a loan agreement (the "Loan Agreement") and obtaining a loan from the Bank payable from any legally available revenues of the Municipality, including the Special Sales Tax, in the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$1,800,000, in one or more federally taxable or tax-exempt series (the "Loan"), or any combination thereof.

8. The Governing Body reasonably expects that it will incur expenditures for the Authorized Purposes prior to the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan in the estimated principal amount of \$1,800,000, and that it should declare its official intent to reimburse such expenditures with the proceeds of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan upon the issuance or execution thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE MUNICIPALITY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. This resolution is adopted pursuant to the Act.

SECTION 2. Pursuant to the Act, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, if issued, shall be general obligations of the Municipality payable as to principal and interest out of and secured by the Special Sales Tax, the proceeds generated by the operation of the recreational facilities or parks, and an irrevocable pledge of the avails of a tax to be levied annually upon all the taxable property within the geographical limits of the Municipality, which tax, together with any other moneys available for such purpose, shall be sufficient to provide for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation according to the terms thereof.

SECTION 3. Pursuant to the Act, if issued, the Loan shall be an obligation of the Municipality payable as to principal and interest out of and secured by the legally available revenues of the Municipality, including the Special Sales Tax and the proceeds generated by the operation of the recreational facilities or parks.

SECTION 4. The Governing Body, acting for and on behalf of the Municipality, does hereby declare its intention to issue and sell the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds or the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or obtain the Loan from the Bank, all pursuant to the Act.

SECTION 5. The General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, in the amount, for the Authorized Purposes, and secured as aforesaid, will be authorized to be executed at a meeting of the Governing Body to be held at the City Hall located at 133 North Front Street in the Municipality on Tuesday, May 16, 2023, at 5:00 p.m. Pursuant to the Act, if a petition signed by not less than 10% of the qualified electors of the Municipality, or 1,500, whichever is the lesser, be filed objecting to and protesting the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election on the question of the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan may be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan may be issued without an election on the question of the

execution thereof, at any time within a period of 2 years after the date above specified, and may be sold under the regular procedure for issuing and selling the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, pursuant to further orders of the Governing Body.

SECTION 6. This resolution shall be published once a week for at least 3 consecutive weeks in the *Tate Record,* a newspaper published in and having a general circulation in the Municipality and qualified under the provisions of Section 13-3-31, Mississippi Code of 1972, as amended. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than 21 days prior to the date fixed herein for the authorization of the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, and the last publication shall be made not more than 7 days prior to such date.

SECTION 7. The City Clerk of the Municipality shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publisher of the aforesaid newspaper the customary affidavit of publication of this resolution and to have the same before the Governing Body on the date and hour specified in Section 5 hereof.

SECTION 8. The Governing Body by subsequent resolution shall take such actions as may be necessary to specify the terms and conditions of the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan.

SECTION 9. If any one or more of the provisions of this resolution shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision or provisions had not been contained herein.

SECTION 10. Pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations (the "Reimbursement Regulations"), the Governing Body hereby declares its official intent to reimburse expenditures made for the Authorized Purposes prior to the issuance of the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Bonds, the General Obligation Parks and Recreation Improvements Qualified Obligation, or the Loan, to the extent permitted by the Reimbursement Regulations.

Following the reading of the foregoing resolution and discussion thereof, Alderman made the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution and Alderman seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:
